This fine old building served the Mont Alto community until 1956...<u>59 years</u>. It stood on Park Street at the very location where the new Mont Alto Elementary School would be built in 1957.

Chimney Fire Perils Mont Alto School

Firemen poured 150 gallons of water down the chimney of the Mont Alto Elementary School early last evening to quench a smokestack blaze in the 60-year-old frame building on Park Street.

The Mont Alto Volunteer Fire Company was summoned about 6:15 p.m. after neighbors on Constitution Avenue sighted the flying sparks and notified school janitor Wilbur Heefner. Firemen operated from the roof to run a hose down the two-story chimney to drown the blaze.

Chimney repair work will be needed before the coal-burning furnace is again placed in use, firemen said.

Some 110 elementary pupils nearing the close of a 12-day Christmas and New Year's vacation, are concerned regarding the completion of repairs prior to Monday when students are slated to return to classes.

Desks To Be Cleared From School Today

The first step toward actual demolition of the Mont Alto elementary school is slated to begin today with the removal of desk and seat furniture.

School equipment is to be transferred to Waynesboro pending construction of the new school. Both of the pianos purchased within the last few years are to be used by Mont Alto pupils during their two terms in Waynesboro while awaiting completion of the \$250,000 building here.

Present plans call for the breaking of ground within the next ten days.

Elementary School To Open September 8

The fall term of the Mont Alto Elementary School begins Wednesday, September 8. Grades one to six will be accommodated in the present building.

Seventh and eighth graders will attend Waynesboro Junior High School. Transportation will be provided by the Mont Alto School District's two new buses.

This term marks the first in local school history that grades one to six will occupy the entire four-room building which formerly housed eight grades.

Parents Protest Third Grade Split

Division of the third grade at the Mont Alto elementary school acroused complaints from parents last night at the meeting of school directors

Fathers and mothers appeared before the board to voice dissatisfaction with the arrangement which was put into effect yesterday on the first day of the fall term.

A spokesman for the board said that some five or six parents visited the meeting. Fathers and mothers expressed the feeling that third grade pupils being taught in the second grade classroom might receive less than their fair share of instruction since they must share their teacher with second grade children.

They asked directors to unify the third grade as of former pears instead of continuing the division which results in half the class sharing a second grade room and the other half being taught with fourth graders.

The arrangement came about through the number of third grade pupils enrolled at the school. Some: 25 boys and girls are registered in the grade which is the largest in the school.

Directors took steps to remedy the situation by contacting executives of the Waynesboro Area Joint School System. The issue will be aired at a special meeting today which may result in the transfer of sixth grade pupils to Waynesboro. The move would free Lorren Stull, new fifth and sixth grade teacher here, of one of his classes and would permit rearrangement of room scheduling.

MONT ALTO BOARD GETS SCHOOL BIDS

Studies Total Base Offers of \$214,829 for Elementary School in Borough

Bids for the construction of the proposed Mont Alto elementary school were opened at a meeting last night of the Mont Alto school board and the Mont Alto School District Authority, called for the sole purpose of opening the bids.

sole purpose of opening the bids.

After the representative of the Buchart Engineering Co., architects for the authority, opened the bids, they were reviewed by the school board's attorney, Millard Ullman, and the legal representative of Reeder, and Rhodes, bond counsel for the authority.

Low bids in the amount of \$214.-829 were held for consideration by the board which till take action on them within 45 days. W. R. Oyer, general contractor. Waynesboro, submitted the low base bid of \$147,990; Keystone Grate and Blower, Chambersburg, submitted a bid of \$20,692 for the plumbing; E. W. Pyles, McConnellsburg, a bid of \$30.895 for the heating; and for the electrical work, Waynesboro Electric Co. submitted the low base bid of \$15,-252.

Other bids for the general contract were: McCoy Bros., Gettysburg, \$162,750; Gettysburg Construction, \$154,850; O. H. Hostetter, Hanover, \$158,815; Hill and Ivins, Chambersburg, \$169,500; R. E. Hafer and Sons, Chambersburg, \$175,990; A. B. Seifert and Sons, York, \$163,000; Earl L. Cump, Chambersburg, \$184,320; Glenn I. Garman, Chambersburg, \$177,600; J. Guy Tosten, Chambersburg, \$189,400.

112 Mont Alto Students To Transfer Here During Construction Of School

The transfer of 112 pupils to Waynesboro elementary schools during the construction of Mont Alto's proposed new school, has received the approval of Mont Alto directors.

Members of the School Board pointed out that they would like to accommodate at least the primary grades in Mont Alto during the school construction, but that no suitable quarters are available.

They pointed out that Mont Alto church basements and other locations are not equipped with lavatory and other facilities required by the State for even temporary use as a school.

According to the motion adopted Thursday evening by Mont Alto directors, the Waynesboro board will be requested to house the Mont Alto pupils in one building, if possible, and under the instruction of their own teachers.

A spokesman of the Mont Alto Board said it was understood that three rooms of the Snyder Avenue School may be available for use by the out-of-town pupils.

BUS USE PLANNED

Special supervision will be arranged for younger pupils, especially during the noon hour, the spokesman added. Mont Alto teachers will probably travel by bus in company with the students.

Providing construction of the proposed elementary school in Mont Alto is underway by fall, the September term of school will be transfer time for Mont. Alto students.

Present plans call for the use of Mont Alto buses to provide transportation. High school and junior high pupils will make an earlier start to school and the buses will return to Mont Alto and make a second trip each morning to transport the elementary school pupils. The Mont Alto Board also ap-

proved the use of the school for the Caledonia-Quincy Little League which will meet March 13 at 7:30 p.m. to organize for the season.

Roy Cleaver of the Pennsylvania Department of Public Instruction will be the principal speaker tomorrow night when the Mont Alto Elementary School is formally dedicated.

The affair, to be staged in the new building, will be at 7:30 p.m.

Music will be by the Waynesboro Area Senior High School choir directed by Francis A. Nogle, and an instrumental music group directed by Robert A. Zimmerman.

Rev. Edgar E. Spatz of the Evangelical United Brethren Church and Rev. Carl Cosslett of the Methodist Church will have the invocation and benediction.

William C. Sethrist, chairman of the Mont Alto School District Authority, will present the building to President Dile. On behalf of the Evangelical United Brethren and Methodist Churches, Albert Hamilton will present the Bible and Ralph Spangler will present the flag for the Quincy Township Lions. Lorren L. Stull, principal of the school, will accept for the school.

Boro wants to purchase former Mont Alto school

MONT ALTO — Borough Council has scheduled a public meeting next Monday for all residents interested in helping the borough acquire the former Mont Alto Elementary School.

The meeting is tentatively set for 7 p.m. in the cafeteria of the former school.

After researching the possibility of acquiring a state grant to purchase the now-vacant school from Waynesboro Area School District, borough engineering consultant Maurice Gossert of Nassaux-Hemsley Inc. recommended to council that it apply for a Community Development Block Grant from the state.

Community Development Block Grants are given each year to qualifying counties and municipalities throughout the state. Funds from the grant are intended for specific projects that improve a community.

Gossert pointed out to council that the borough is at a slight disadvantage because applications for the grant must be submitted to the state by May 2. This does not leave much time for the borough to get organized and complete the paperwork needed for the application, officials said Monday.

Gossert added that the most important part of the application is an income survey that must be conducted if the borough is to qualify for the grant.

The purpose of the survey is to prove that at least 51% of the people who would benefit from the project have moderately low or low income. At least 90% of the people who intend to use the facility must be surveyed. If the borough is unable to meet this qualification, chances of receiving the grant are very low, Gossert said, because the borough will be considered a "non-entitled community."

Another stipulation of the grant is that the school may not be used as a municipal building.

Acceptable uses of the building include a drug rehabilitation center, community center, library, senior citizens' center or community athletic facility.

Council urged all interested citizens to attend Monday night's meeting.

Mont Alto seeks grant to buy school building

MONT ALTO — Mont Alto Borough Council approved a grant application Tuesday night requesting more than \$170,000 in state funds to buy the former Mont Alto Elementary School building.

The application is for the first year of a threeyear grant program in which the borough plans to ask for \$523,330 from the state Department of Community Affairs. The first year's grant would pay for the purchase of the school and basic renovations. Grants during the next two years would pay for extended renovations and the establishment of several programs at the building.

The application is based on results of an economic survey completed Tuesday that revealed the community is eligible to apply for the grant, according to James Nelson, director of municipal programs for Nassaux-Hemsley Inc. The Chambersburg engineering firm is overseeing the application process for the

The borough's initial plans call for multiple uses of the building, including space for a senior citizens center, a library, a Boy Scout program room and a

drug rehabilitation center.

Auction of school planned

WAYNESBORO — The Waynesboro Area School District will put the former Mont Alto Elementary School up for auction at 10 a.m. Nov. 3.

According to Business Administrator Wallace Jones, the board passed a resolution Monday putting the building up for public sale on that day if it is not sold by private sale in the meantime. He said the board will meet Nov. 13 to review the bids.

Mont Alto Borough Council has already made one offer to purchase the building, but that offer was rejected.

Mont Alto Council President Dean Verdier said last week the bid was \$40,000.

Mont Alto boro wants to buy school

MONT ALTO - Borough Council agreed Monday to try to buy the former Mont Alto Elementary School.

The undisclosed bid contains three stipulations that the Waynesboro Area School District, building owners, will have to meet as part of the purchase negotiations.

The stipulations include a loan with 5% interest to be paid annually with a balloon payment for the remainder of the loan to be paid after five years. The district will be responsible for the cost of an inspection of the underground fuel tank (an estimated \$400) and removal costs, if the fuel tank is deemed unsafe. The district also will have to meet borough zoning requirements for whatever purpose the building is to be used by the borough.

Borough officials have expressed interest in turning the building into a senior citizens center. Another possibility is renting part of the building as a post

Before the vote, borough engineering

consultant Maurice Gossert told council about an inspection of the school by he spoke with were against the Nassaux-Hemsley Inc., a Chambersburg purchase. engineering firm employed by the borough.

Gossert said there will be three significant expenses, including any connected to the fuel tank inspection and possible removal. A garage will have to be built to house borough equipment and vehicles and the school's roof will also have to be replaced within the next five years, according to Gossert. A roof Verdier's statement. would cost an estimated \$40,000.

Gossert estimated annual utility costs for the building of about \$5,000.

Glen Miller, who attended Monday's meeting, called the move to purchase the school "unfair to the taxpavers."

"There are a lot of hidden costs with this purchase that the public is not aware of," Miller said. "It sounds like we are talking about \$250,000 to start with, plus \$50 or \$60,000 in hidden costs. Where are you going to get the money? This town can't afford these big expenditures . . . this is deficit spending."

Miller told council that the residents

Council President Dean Verdier countered Miller's charge by stating that after a door-to door survey of local residents, 70% of those surveyed said they were in favor of the purchase. Verdier also said 99% of those who attended a meeting on the issue raised their hands in favor of the purchase.

Mayor Donald Whitmore corrected

"I think the question posed in the survey and at the meeting was "Do you want us to pursue the purchase of the school?"

Whitmore said that of the people he has spoken to lately about the school, four were in favor, but 20 were against.

Verdier replied, "You are trying to back me into a corner . . you are not telling the truth."

Verdier then called for an executive session.

Miller left the meeting, again asking: "How many more hidden costs are there that the taxpayers don't know about?"

Developers submit high bid for school

MONT ALTO — The former

Mont Alto Elementary School will
be converted into residential or commercial space if a local development
company's bid on the building is
accepted.

TNK Inc. of Mont Alto offered \$77,000 during an auction of the former school by the Waynesboro Area School District Saturday morning. The school board is expected to act on the bid Nov. 13.

"We will look at several options. We haven't decided on anything yet," commented Kevin Rock, a parmer in TNK Inc. with his brother, Todd. "We're going to look at residential conversion as well as commercial.

"The engineering study said it is a structurally sound building," Rock added, "The shell itself is sound; that's what we were concerned about. With a building this size, there are several things you can do with it."

Both Kevin and Todd Rock attended the elementary school, which was built in 1957. It was closed last year as part of the district's consolidation project, under which East Junior High School and Mowrey Elementary School also were closed and eventually sold.

-The Mont Alto building has about two acres of land with it.

The other bidder during Saturday's auction was H. Dean Verdier, president of Mont Alto Borough Council. The borough last month offered the district \$61,000 for the building, but that bid was rejected by the school board.

The borough wanted to use the old school as a senior citizen/community center and library.

More than 50 Mont Alto area residents attended the auction.
